Social Scientists have very diverse backgrounds. They study a range of topics including First Nations Studies, economics, anthropology, sociology, policy, and development studies. Social Scientists may have also taken additional training in project management, facilitation, statistics, and environmental assessment.

Community-Based Researchers typically have Grade 12 or equivalent work experience. Social Scientists usually have a Bachelor of Science or Bachelor of Arts and a Master's or PhD for advanced positions.

Social Scientists help to understand what the possible effects of a project might be on the community and help find ways to maximize the benefits and minimize the down sides. Social Scientists may lead community consultation such as community meetings or one-on-one interviews that help find out what people think about a project and what is important to them. They also research and document what communities are like before the project takes place in order to better understand any changes that occur. Some of the topics Social Scientists consider when assessing project effects on a community include the economy, population demographics, community infrastructure and health services, and culture.

Community-Based Researchers are usually members of the community being studied. They help organize meetings and community events/activities, assist with data collection and interpretation, and help provide the community's perspective.
